Write a 'day in the life of' for an Anglo Saxon blacksmith and their slave highlighting the main events throughout the day – e.g. At 5:30 am – Get the slave to light the furnace ready to heat the metal. 6:00 am collect water from the local stream to use through the day for cooking and cleaning.

Science
Create a detailed timeline of a family member of key events in their life so far- e.g. First steps/first tooth/starting school/learning to ride a bike...

Art
Design and build an Anglo-Saxon settlement using card, boxes or any useful materials either bring these into school to display, or take a photograph so we can see how you got on.

RE
Choose a Hindu god or goddess to research – looking at their role and their responsibilities. Write a fact file about them and include a drawing of your chosen god/goddess.

History
Research the clothing worn by an Anglo-Saxon warrior and worker. What types of clothes did they wear to battle and how were these different to what they wore during everyday life. You could even draw you favourite items from each category.

History
Investigate the local Anglo-Saxon dig at Cammeringham, you can watch the videos, explore the photos section. Create a news report explaining the findings of the 'Searching For Saxons Project'.
