History focus for the term: The Victorians

Science focus for the term – Electricity

RE focus for the term – How do people express their spirituality together?

At Coningsby St Micheal’s, we believe all areas of the curriculum are important. This term we would like you to choose a minimum of 4 activities from the grid below, as your homework tasks. Other than reading and times table practise, no weekly homework will be set. We hope that this style of homework will encourage everyone to take part and give parents a chance to become more involved in working with their children on fun, creative and exciting activities. Children’s completed homework tasks will be recorded and monitored. Children who successfully engage in home learning tasks will be rewarded at school. Please ask parents, family members or friends to join in and have fun. You can you use your homework folders for writing tasks, evidence logs, saving photos or collecting any other evidence of your learning. When evidence is seen we will tick off your tasks and record your choices. We are hoping by giving everyone choices that a selection of activities will be completed by pupils with support from family members.

History – The Victorians

Design a Victorian School Poster:

Create a poster showing rules, layout and lessons in a Victorian classroom.

Rich vs Poor Diary: Write (or act out) a diary entry from either a rich or poor Victorian child. What is your day like?

Invention Challenge: Design your own Victorian invention (draw and label it). What problem does it solve?

Science – Electricity

Switch Hunt: Go around your house and list all the switches you can find. What do they control? Why are they useful?

Electrical Safety Poster: Create a bright poster showing how to stay safe around electricity.

Future Gadget Design: Invent a new gadget that uses electricity—draw and explain how it works.

Maths

Real-Life Fractions: Use food (pizza, toast, fruit) to show fractions like $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{4}$, $\frac{3}{4}$. Take a photo or draw it.

Fraction Number Line: Create your own number line at home showing fractions from 0 to 2.

Equivalent Fractions Hunt: Find examples of equivalent fractions in real life or create your own using drawings (e.g. $\frac{1}{2} = \frac{2}{4}$).

English and Whole Class Reading

Diary Entry – Street Child:

Write a diary entry as Jim from *Street Child*. Describe a day on the streets—how do you feel? What challenges do you face?

Character Description:

Draw a character from either book and write a detailed description using powerful vocabulary, similes and expanded noun phrases.

Front Cover Design:

Design a new book cover for either text. Include a title, illustration and blurb to hook the reader.

Create a simple greeting card with a light (real or drawn design). Label where the circuit, battery and bulb would go.
